Introduction

America has a long history of quiltmaking and by the 1970's the art of quiltmaking had become a bit of a "passé" craft and was considered somewhat of an old fashioned hobby.

In 1976 the United States of America celebrated its Bicentennial and as part of the celebrations, citizens of the USA were encouraged to go down into their cellars or up into their attics and discover quilts that might be hibernating there. As a result, many hundreds of guilts were unearthed and discovered and thus a new enthusiasm for quilting and the history surrounding quilting abounded. Australia too, has a quiltmaking history and up to the 1970's, most patchwork had been hand sewing, mostly using the English paper piecing method.

As a result of the resurgence of interest in America, Australian crafters started to get more interested in quilting and as such the modern patchwork and quilting movement had arrived in Australia



While the revolution of modern quilting might have taken a bit longer in Australia, it did coincide with the introduction of modern tools and the domestic use of computers and suddenly patchwork and quilting was taken to new levels. And as the saying goes, we've never looked back! As Queensland Quilters Inc. celebrates its 25th Anniversary, it is time to take a glance back at how we came about, what we've been doing and achieving and where we hope to be going in the future.

This history of QQ Inc. is not comprehensive by any means, but is a snapshot of events and functions of QQ Inc and its members over the past 25 years.

How It All Began

In Queensland up until the early 1980's patchworkers tended to work alone, without much noise, creating quilts either by hand or very occasionally machine pieced. The craft of quilting was encompassed by The Embroiderers' Guild of Qld but quilters felt the need for a "purpose driven" body to belong to. As crafters started to feel a need for an organization for like-minded enthusiasts, casual discussion started to take place. Ruth Stoneley had recently opened her business Patchwork and Quilting Supplies in Highgate Hill and had commenced classes. Olwyn Beech and Betty Rees encouraged the first quilt show of Ruth's at the Coorparoo Uniting Church. On the Friday and Saturday of the 21st and 22nd of October 1983 the Queensland Quilt Exhibition was held at the Coorparoo Uniting Church Hall, where Ruth Stoneley, her friends and her students presented their work of over fifty patchwork quilts. Special attractions on that day included a lecture by Ruth titled "Quilting Today and Yesterday", on the history, charm and practical function of patchwork. Other

attractions were a demonstration of quilting techniques by Ruth and other quilters. A hands on workshop titled "Are you Interested in Making a Quilt?" was delivered at that time. A selection of patchwork materials, gifts and books from BCF Book Store were also there. Also and most importantly for QQ, a book was available for visitors at the exhibition to indicate their enthusiasm for a quilters' guild to be established here in Queensland. Some 80 signatures were taken that day and as a result several informal gatherings by various interested quilters took place to discuss the formation of a guild. A steering committee was set up to investigate the possibility of a quilt guild for Queensland. At one stage a suggestion was made that the Queensland guild be a branch of the recently formed The Quilters Guild of NSW. Following this very successful exhibition, Ruth Stoneley, Jenny Riley and Inari Thiel activated, a steering committee and on the 11 $^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$ February 1984 the rules and aims of the proposed guild were collated and discussed. Following this informal meeting at Ruth's shop in February, the first AGM was held on 29th March 1984 and with a beginning membership of 220 members from New South Wales to Papua New Guinea and 60 cottage members. QQ was a going concern. The Constitution was drawn up, with the objectives being much the same as those of today. The policy statement was: "Queensland Quilters is a purely cultural organization." The membership was full, honorary, students and pensioners, country, group affiliation and cottage. The last classification was abandoned on Incorporation.

Queensland Quiltmakers turn scraps into art

Quiltmaking involves the spirit of craft – the desire to make and have something of one's own. It can involve recycling of old materials – the concept of "save your scraps for me" from which many patchwork quilts have been made – or the purchase of metres of new material from which the quilt as an art form may or may not emerge. Some of the great quilts of 19th century America came from family or friends

working bees to pool labor and ideas. And, as Jenny Riley, Secretary of QQ, tells it, behind the formation of this groups in Brisbane this year was the philosophy of communication — bringing together women working alone, often unknowingly quite close in the same suburbs, in a bonding of mutual help and exchanged knowledge. The idea of quilters getting together really developed after an exhibition by patchwork specialist Ruth Stoneley and her students last year.

Ruth is very much an artistcraftsman — and probably Queensland's most distinguished exponent of quilting. Her Queensland Quilt was a commission for Government House in 1982, and other quilts of hers have been shown in Crafts Expo '82 Sydney and bought by the Queensland Art Gallery for exhibition during the 1982 Commonwealth Games.

From January 14-18, Queensland Quilters will hold their first summer school at the Technical and Further Education College at Kitchener Road, Ascot, in a building which TAFE has lent them. Basic patchwork techniques will be included in the beginners' classes. Workshop will be conducted by Chill Chenich and Helen Hale as well as more advanced classes.

The First Twelve Months - A Year of Firsts


President's report in the first Material Facts Volume I/I March 1984 as follows:






Linda McGuire offered "Box making" at the first QQ workshops in 1984

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"I like the way quilters are normal everyday people, they don't feel they need to "dress" or "act" the part like many artists are want to do. There is also a sense of acceptance and encouragement of all skill levels, eliminating the sense of competition that could otherwise manifest."

First Workshops

The first workshop session was held 19-20 May 1984 at the Bardon Professional Centre at Bardon. Times were 9:00am to 4:00pm. Two days of workshops were offered at a cost of \$10.00 per day.

Members could choose to attend each workshop in one day or the second day could be spent completing a project in the workshop of their choice.

Workshops offered were: Linda McGuire, boxes; Heidi Rix, speed techniques; and Chill Chernick, basic shapes. It was also announced that Virginia Avery from New York and Jean Schultz of California were going to offer workshops with QQ in the August of 1984.

Virginia was offering two workshops, whilst Jean was offering three. Cost \$30.00 per day.

Virginia's workshops were as follows:

The first workshop was titled Big, Bold and Beautiful (Surface design and embellishment for accessories). The second workshop was titled Pictorial Appliqué (Land, city and people-scapes in fabric) and was being offered on the 1st and 2nd of September. Jean's workshops were on Shadow Quilting, Expanding Design Possibilities, and Machine Quilting for Wearables. Workshops were held at The Embroiderers' Guild premises in Brunswick Street, Fortitude Valley

Places were limited to 15 per workshop, first in best dressed.

Two places were held in each workshop for out of town members.

Cottage Groups

Cottage Groups were an important part of the beginnings of QQ and members were encouraged to organise Cottage Groups in their local areas.

It was up to the members to put a notice in the local newspaper or library to advertise the Cottage Groups.

It was important to note that the Group Leader of the Cottage Group was not necessarily the expert quilter.

Most groups would have quilters who were at different levels of expertise, and the idea of a Cot-

tage Group was to learn from each other.

The QQ Committee held a list of available "teachers" that would be available to hold classes with individual Cottage Groups.

Financial arrangements were up to the individual Cottage Group organiser.

At March 1984 there were seventeen registered Cottage Groups running under the auspices of QQ.

Quilter Profile - Inari Thiel

Inari was introduced to the craft of quilting during a six month sojourn in USA during the northern winter of 1980—1981.

Upon Inari's return she joined The Embroiderers' Guild Queensland which at that time was the only organisation with any interest whatso-ever in the patchwork field.

When the idea of establishing a Quilters Guild was mooted in 1983, Inari was very excited at the prospect, and threw her full support behind the project.

In one of her letters to members in MF, Inari wrote:

"Good news that both Glenda Reid and Carol Seeto have won awards for their patchwork in the RNA Needlework Section at the show.

Wouldn't it be lovely to have our own section at the RNA?"

In presenting her first Annual President's Report Inari wrote:

"I'd like to pay tribute to those responsible for setting up the organization in its present form, namely the members of the steering committee.

This steering committee formulated our constitution and did all that was necessary to bring us together in our Inaugural General Meeting a little over 12 months ago.

Without their vision and enthusiasm, quilting in Queensland would have remained disjointed and uncoordinated.

Each of us largely ignorant of the existence of a number of like-minded people and reading enviously the accounts of quilting groups and their workshops and exhibitions in the USA.

It was with the members of the steering committee who stopped saying "what if" and said "Let's do: and they did!"

Jenny served QQ in a number of ways. Not only was she Secretary for the inaugural year, but she was also a member of the steering committee which was vital to the commencement of QQ as a going concern.

She continued her considerable involvement by being President for two terms

Jenny was very active in the crafts scene and also belonged to several other craft organizations.

She taught for QQ, TAFE and did other freelance teaching.

In the later years Jenny contributed tremendously to MF, with herfunny, witty and very clever poetry.

Jenny was very good at rousing the troops. In her first message to members in MF Jenny wrote:



"If you have any suggestions let us know, after all this organization is for us all.

With a quilt, the more you can put into making it, the better the result will be, so think of QQ as you would a quilt."

"Miegunyah" Quilt Hanging

In October 1986 a special day was held at "Miegunyah" the historical home in Newstead. Quilts were hung off the verandahs and displayed wherever possible.

Ladies of the Queensland Women's Historical Association conducted tours around the house.

It was a very popular day and the entry queue was very long. Jenny Riley made some lovely patchwork cushions that were raffled to raise funds for QQ.

Anne was a self-taught quilter and started quilting in 1981.

Anne's particular love is designing miniature quilts.

Anne became an accredited teacher of the Canberra Patchwork Group before moving to Brisbane in 1985.

In her report to the AGM, Anne wrote:

"Twelve months ago it was with some trepidation that I took on the job of President – could I do it? I'll let you be the judge of how good I've been.

From my point of view, the year has had its headaches, but I've learnt a lot.

It's the happy times I'll always remember, the

people I've met and the quilts I've seen, the sharing and friendship."

In Anne's last message to the membership through MF Anne wrote:

"It is so rewarding to see our membership numbers up, and this year we have twice as many affiliated groups joining than last year."

Incorporation for QQ

(A recollection regarding Incorporation from Lyn Barber)

An extraordinary meeting was held at the Bardon Centre 7th February 1987 to discuss incorporation.

This eventually took place 16 August 1988 at 12 noon, at a special meeting in the rumpus room of Anne Whitsed's home in St Johns Wood.

I remember we were waiting for some official to

arrive at the appointed time.

From then on QQ operated under the Model Rules which are in line with the original constitution but far more detailed and in line with the requirements of the Justice Department.

Briefly, the outcomes of Incorporation were:

 Cottage groups would continue as before

- Details of cottage groups registered with QQ could be provided to others
- Cottage group members need not be QQ members
- QQ meetings open to anyone, members show card
- Workshops open to all—non members pay higher fee
- Exhibitions open to members only

Quilter Profile - Ruth Stoneley

Ruth was a self taught quilter, and began making quilts while working as a craft instructor at the Multiple Sclerosis Centre at Dutton Park. Ruth was awarded a professional development grant by the Craft Board of Australia 1982. She started the first quilt shop in Queensland after completing a series of quilts made possible as a recipient of that grant.

In 1985 Ruth was awarded a Churchill Fellowship to study historical and contemporary quilts in the USA— three wonderful months of opportunity

As a foundation member of The Quilters Guild in

NSW Ruth was keen to see similar groups developed in Queensland. Ruth and her helpers gathered names at the first exhibition of students' work and from there QQ was established.

In 1988 Ruth was the only Australian lecturer at the First International Quilt Festival at Salzburg, Austria attended by 1200 quilters from 32 countries. 1988 also saw Ruth receive the Bicentennial Woman of Achievement Award.

Also known as an international textile artist and quilt maker, Ruth exhibited in Australia, Japan,

USA, Indonesia and Europe and traveled extensively. (Before making quilts she had concentrated on embroidery, dyeing and other treatments of fibres and fabrics.)

During her career Ruth taught, lectured and exhibited widely in Australia and overseas, having 10 solo exhibitions and many group shows. Ruth closed her store Patchwork Supplies in 2001 after nearly 20 years so she could focus on art quilt practice and design fabrics. Sadly, Ruth passed away in 2007.

quilts of irregular sizes that could be exhibited as one whole work. With Jan T Urquhart's expertise at graphing out a master plan they drew lots for their



Lyn Barber became a member of QQ in 1985, and since then she has been an enthusiastic supporter of Queensland Quilters activities. She became a member of the Management Committee in 1993 and President in 1994.

During her term as President the Quilt Valuation panel was consolidated and quilt valuations began on a regular basis. Lyn convinced the committee to approve the Teacher Accreditation Program and became the Inaugural Convenor for the TAP.

Also during her term as President, QQ took on the responsibility of an

annual Quilt-o-rama (previously biennial) to be held in conjunction with the Womens Weekly Needlework and Craft and Art Fair.

This was an entirely new concept for QQ and not only did the first show in 1994 have to be organised in a very short time, but also our rights, conditions and independence had to be carefully negotiated with the promoters, Expertise Events. Lyn's term as President ended in 1996 but she continued on the Management Committee, Valuation Panel, Teacher Accreditation Program and Quiltorama committee. In 1997 she

was appointed Quilt-o-rama coordinator as well as continuing her valuable contribution to the Valuation and Teacher Accreditation Programs.

Lyn continued in these positions throughout 1998. Lyn's determination to lift the profile of QQ and promote the work of its members has been a large focus of her contribution to QQ.

Lyn has dedicated her time, energy and expertise to the advancement and education of QQ and its members of a long period of time. Lyn was presented with Life Membership in 1999.

Through networking its members an organization gains strength. Quilter Profile - Life Member Marion "Grace" Richards

Marion "Grace" Richards epitomizes the essence of volunteering. She has provided outstanding voluntary work to the greater Brisbane and Queensland underprivileged Community for the past 42 of her 84 years. Her most significant impact on this community is her ongoing vision, determination, and dedication, to bring happiness to seriously ill children, (and their parents), through the highly praised and innovative 'Linus Quilts Project'. This unique program provides colourful, creative quilts to children in hospital who are receiving on-going treatment. These quilts bring joy and security, as the child brings it with them for each 'over night stay'. Hundreds of these quilts are needed each year, and Grace is tireless in her efforts, her leadership, motivation and dedication helping to keep this program alive. Grace also offers her unswerving support for the SIDS Parents, through the making and supplying of 'SIDS Quilts' for the use of individuals and as a form of recognition for the organization locally and nationally. Remaining ever mindful of the family tragedy in these traumatic circumstances demands dedication and courage, for Grace, these quilts are truly "Blankets of Love". All of this work is in

addition to her continuing support for the making of charity fundraising quilts for a wide variety of hospitals, sporting organizations, and the broader Queensland community. The 'Linus Quilts Project' and the 'SIDS Ouilts' are now considered to be of "National Importance", as they are supported and recognized by State and Federal Government Agencies. Grace has been a widowed-pensioner since 1968; she has five children; II grand children, and 10 great grand children. She also has a lifelong passion for sewing and volunteering for the underprivileged community. To achieve these exceptional results for the needy, Grace has herself, continued to purchase several different types of expensive computerized sewing machines to assist in her charity work and daily sewing activities. Her pension is supplemented by undertaking additional odd sewing jobs for local pensioners which helps to pay for these machines, as she does not rely on either family or friends for handouts to survive. Charity started for Grace in the wider Queensland Community some 42 years ago in the school tuck-shop environment, where Grace sup-

ported the P&C at Oakleigh State School through the tuck -shop activities, and the making of local school uniforms for needy children. This started in 1965 and concluded at the end of 1971. In 1972, Grace transferred her support to Kelvin Grove High School with the same enthusiasm, which initially lasted until her daughter left in 1976. However Grace decided to continue this support for several years past that time. Grace also joined the Auxiliaries at St Andrews War Memorial Hospital in the early seventies, where she participated in general mending of various garments for the hospital and the patients alike. This continued for 21 years until the Auxiliary was finally disbanded.

In 1970, Grace joined the Queensland Girl Guides Association where she initially became a member of the P&C, and then its Secretary. She became the District Commissioner for Ashgrove, and then Quarter Master/ Cook for the large Guide and Scouting events held at Kindilan, Samford-Baden Powel Park, Toowoomba, Brampton Island and a great many more.

This wonderful association went on for nearly fifteen years, well into the 1980's.

Grace also went on to join Meals on Wheels in 1982 and continued volunteering until late in 1986. In the early eighties, Grace was asked to become a 'patients friend' at the Prince Charles Hospital. This was at the Acquired Brain Injury Unit where the patients' family members essentially stop coming to see their former loved ones. This association continued with a patient named 'Charlie' for approximately 15 years. Of greatest importance to Grace is her 23year association with QQ, where she was a 'Founding Member' in 1984. She is now a Life Member, awarded for her charitable services, one of four in existence today.

Grace is truly an inspirational role model for those of us who support her in QQ, and the broader Queensland underprivileged community. Grace recognised early in life her sense of purpose, and chose active participation to support the underprivileged, not passive participation. Grace was a very deserving recipient of the 2007 Premiers Award for Queensland Seniors in recognition of her dedication to those less fortunate than herself.

We consider ourselves very blessed to have a fellow quilter of Grace's caliber in our midst.

They had a large range of patchwork, tatting, floral and other designs available and even did special orders, "customizing" a truck with a glitter star for one small boy who felt that his badge was overshadowed by his mother's hearts and stars design.



finished work at the QQ Quilt Show, at the best venue in town. How good is that!"



Sharyn was awarded the Quilters Guild Scholarship (NSW) in 2003 for study in the United States.


In 2006 was selected as the feature artist for Bernina Australia (sewing machines), and traveled and exhibited her work nationally, representing the Bernina company.





Learning with QQ in the first 10 years

Lyn Barber Remembers

WORKSHOPS

The first workshop was held 19-20 May 1984 with Linda McGuire teaching boxes, Heidi Rix, speed techniques and Chill Chernick basic shapes. The cost was \$10 per day. Right from the beginning of QQ, there seemed to be a great emphasis on learning all aspects of the craft.

"There seemed to be no end of workshops that were available for QQ members to attend and achieve skills. After the first workshops in 1984, more workshops followed at the old Hamilton Fire Station. Jenny Riley taught Seminole and machine quilting, Heather's workshop was a wall hanging from a picture. Painting and Dyeing of Synthetic Fabrics with Cynthia Morgan and a workshop from Noreen Dunne form Sydeny were held in October 1986.

Ruby Houston Remembers too!

"After finding a flyer in her shopping from "Home Yardage" my daughter enrolled in a machine appliqué class. She suggested that I join her as there was also baby sitting included (as long as Mothers fed and diapered the babies).

We rolled up at Sommerville House school to attend QQ Summer School with our tee shirt fabric and red and green cotton to learn how to machine appliqué an apple. The summer school at Sommerville House 5-11 January 1987 must have been a giant exercise in organization. The merchants present were Four Patch on Point, BCF Books and the Quilt and Craft Cottage from Bellbowrie. Patchwork Supplies nearby stayed open longer hours.

A list of classes may give you a picture of the patchwork scene at that time. Anne Whitsed: Crazy Patchwork vest. Quilters' tote Bag and Shadow Appliqué. Jenny Riley: Queensland Houses, Seminole Work Bag and looking at blocks. Gail Chalker: Scraps can be fun. Hetty van Boven: colours are like people. Robyn Ginn: Wild Flowers Appliqué. Helen Hale: Speed Techniques. Heather Hanes: String guilted Vests. Eileen Cooke: Stained Glass Appliqué and Inari Thiel: Candlewicking, Overseas tutors broadened the horizons with Katie Pasquini lecturing and teaching 3D design and colour. Mallcom Harrison who had a particular interest in machine

President Anne Whitsed visited each class room to welcome everyone on behalf of QQ I raised my hand an asked "What is QQ?". My daughter was so embarrassed that she slid under the desk. Anne answered "I will tell you later". As a result I joined QQ. After receiving Material Facts for about 6 months I plucked up courage to attend my first meeting at Hale Street Church Hall. I remember telling my husband that night that I had met the friendliest group of ladies ever. Average attendance was about 18 members who sat around in a circle. Show

quilting held a workshop called "Calico and Lace". He is a multi-media artist from New Zealand whose work hangs in the Galleria of their Parliament House. Jinny Bever who designed fabrics and wrote books on piecing and colour lectured at the Bardon Professional Development Centre. This was the era of the "cottage coat" described as "a unique coat pattern made from a square or rectangle of pieced work." Mine is a much loved number in a synthetic linen, colours navy, blues and dark lime. Barbara Stewart had us attach a smart rolled collar. June Oliver always had a demonstration or learning exercise at the gathering, for example using a cutter (small sized blade only available then) and board. She had samples showing application of techniques.

By 1988 workshops were conducted by tutors whose

and Tell was conducted by everything being passed around the circle.

My daughter and I also attended a beginners log cabin class conducted by Patricia Moran. On thanking Patricia for an enjoyable day she was most surprised to hear that we thought there was a whole new language to learn eg. Cutting mats, rulers and rotary cutters. She was unaware we were such beginners. I bought the first edition of Down Under Quilts and after 3 months decided to attempt the quilt patterns printed. I would spend 21/2

days drawing the pattern onto cornflakes boxes for templates then cutting out the fabric and marking the 1/4" seam allowance with a pencil, then 1/2 a day to machine the seams.

Thanks to much advice from QQ members after 2 years I had completed my 1st quilt top. (It took 2 years for all the quilt blocks to be printed in Down Under Quilts).

I have attended many workshops over the years and 20 years later am still a regular attending and enjoying meetings."

Anecdotes from past and present members

I have some good memories of my membership with QQ. I have enjoyed the retreats over the years I attended. Working with Sue Morgan with the Raffle Quilt was fun. Getting up to talk in front of everyone gave me confidence. Being Correspondence Secretary was also a good experience. It gave me an insight into the workings of QQ. It was also good for my own personal development which in turn helped with the development of my own patchwork journey. It was lovely to work with Wendy

Brittain.

The first time I went to a meeting I thought "wow, all these women with the same passion as me". Each month I look forward to the meeting, and enjoy the friendship, fellowship, the guest speakers, traders and especially the library.

I received a quilt from the girls I worked with in Hobart. I was the quilt ringleader for all our birthday quilts – so this is rather special that they did it all on their own. It was a complete surprise.

I was a very new Quilter but very keen to participate in anything. We had a Challenge Quilt to make using so many different materials. I did one called "A Mouse's Wedding". I wanted to do a pond at the bottom of the garden, but I was not allowed to use any more materials, so I decided to do a Wedding Feast instead using the same material I had used for the Church - White Satin. I embroidered tiny Knives and Forks, cheese, places etc. It was judged by eleanor peace-bailey from America. She picked the winners and then spoke about each entrant. When she reached mine, she hesitated for some time and then said: "And this is TACKY!!" Well, we couldn't stop laughing. It WAS tacky. I have never lived it down. I was a very new quilting, so I guess that is one excuse.

The progress on my sister Judith's quilt was held up because I "lost" a very necessary piece of 'cream on cream" fabric. We searched the house in every nook, I searched the shops to try to match it: and for 3 months was frustrated -UNITL I found it! Where? Lying along the bottom of an overnight travel bag the bottom being the same colour as the fabric. I had taken the fabric and unfinished quilt to show Judith and left it there!! The laughs came later!!

Having bought the first edition of Down Under Quilt Magazine, I read and re-read it many times and decided to try the patterns included. It was a sampler quilt. I bought the fabric from Patchwork Supplies. It took me 2 full days to make templates from corn flakes boxes and cut fabric using 1/4" seams with pencil and ruler. Piecing one block by hand would then take about 3 hours. DUQ printed 3 patterns in each magazine, so it took me 2 years to get all the patterns to make my first quilt top.

I went to a lecture many years ago by Mary Ellen Hopkins and bought a video she had of "The Pineapple Made Easy" (about pineapple log cabin). My children were teenagers at the time and they had great fun in watching it and teasing me for a very long time. She is an entertaining lecturer in real life with quilters, but on a video with teenagers, she was a bit of a novelty.



Anecdotes from past and present members

Having joined QQ January 1987 to get Material Facts, and know what was going on, after 6 months I attended my 1st meeting at Hale Street. There were 18 members present, sitting in a circle. Show and Tell was passed around to each person sitting in the circle. It was the friendliest group of ladies I have ever met and I have been attending QQ meetings ever since.

Unexpected visitors had to carefully walk around dozens of my I Spy blocks which were lying on the "design board" – the living room floor, prior to being stitched together.

The evening ended with studied comments on the visitor's preferred arrangement of the blocks, many of which ended up in the final quilt.

My friend Teresa Warren has been very influential in my quilting journey, she has challenged me, opened my eyes, given me confidence, made me have a go, dragged me to shows, helped me with colour and technique and amazed me with her ability to work out how much fabric I need, in her head.

During my fifteen years as a member of QQ I have encountered many quilters from all walks of life and socio economic circumstances.

In every case, I have found a "generosity of spirit" I find no where else.

I feel I have a voice at QQ and that I am treated as an equal amongst this incredible melting pot of wonderful women.

I experimented on my own for the first few years, then I saw an exhibition of students quilts organised by Ruth Stoneley at Coorparoo Uniting Church in 1983. I completed a sampler quilt course with her in 1984, then started working in her shop in 1985. I was fortunate to participate in numerous workshops with visiting tutors over the years, but my basics were learnt with Ruth.

Early in my quilting days, I read a story in a quilting magazine about how a lady had hung a quilt above the bed of a relative in hospital and how it had been such a draw card and talking point with the patient, staff and visitors.

Many years later, my Mum was admitted to a nursing home and she was a very shy person. I decided to try the same approach re the quilt in hospital. It really worked!! Mum was always interested in my sewing projects and when I showed her the fabric for our Henzell Street Quilters' Challenge, I said, "it sure will be a challenge won't it". Her reply in a quiet shy voice was "You call it a challenge, but I'd call it a headache!". Hence the name of the challenge and after I'd won first prize I hung it at the head of her bed in the nursing home and it sure did bring some conversation to her from the staff and really bought her out of her shell.
